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Making Integration Happen: International Lessons for the NHS



Beyond Ambition: Global Lessons for an Integrated NHS introduces an international response to England's 10 Year Health Plan: Fit for the Future, drawing on insights from health and care leaders, professionals, and citizens across seven countries. Convened by the International Foundation for Integrated Care (IFIC), the document is intended to help NHS leaders look beyond domestic debate and learn from experience elsewhere as they consider how the Plan's vision might be realised in practice.

The contributors largely agree on one point: the Plan is bold. Its ambition—particularly the three strategic shifts from hospital to community, analogue to digital, and sickness to prevention—reflects challenges faced by health systems worldwide. These priorities resonate strongly with international efforts to move towards integrated, people- and community-centred care for population health. The clarity of the case for change, and the emphasis on creating enabling conditions, are widely welcomed.

However, the document's purpose is not to celebrate ambition for its own sake. Drawing on lessons already learned in other systems, contributors highlight where ambition risks faltering without careful execution. A recurring concern is that the Plan articulates a vision rather than a sequenced, actionable programme. International experience suggests that successful reform depends on clear prioritisation, realistic phasing, and sustained attention to the fundamentals that make system change possible.

The perspectives also challenge the Plan's narrow focus on healthcare delivery. Elsewhere, attempts to improve population health have shown that ignoring social care, public health, and the wider determinants of health undermines long-term impact. Similarly, contributors warn that digital transformation, while essential, can deepen fragmentation or inequalities if deployed without a strong person-centred and inclusion lens.

Concrete lessons are offered. These include using technology as an enabler of coordination rather than efficiency-driven task management; simplifying funding and accountability to reduce fragmentation, as seen in systems such as Canterbury in Aotearoa New Zealand; shifting from performance management to learning systems; and moving leadership cultures from command-and-control towards trust, collaboration, and devolved decision-making.

For NHS managers, this collection is an invitation to reflect. The NHS remains globally admired, but other systems are moving quickly by learning from England's past reforms. *Beyond Ambition* asks how the NHS can now do the same—turning vision into delivery by applying hard-won international lessons to its next decade of change.
